Talking the Talk with Employers- Part I

Tyla Pimentel, Shemika Moore & Liz Hanke

The federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act is moving adult education programs to partner closely with employers to prepare learners for success in employment. Dorcas International Institute of RI and Genesis Center are presently working with a number of employers who provide their programs with feedback regarding employment needs, as well as internships and employment prospects for adult learners. In this interactive workshop, Genesis Workforce Coordinator Liz Hanke and DIIRI Employer Relations & Retention Developer Shemika Moore will share some of their challenges and successes with working with employers. Participants will also have the opportunity to strategize and share ideas for employer engagement. Topics will include: - How to approach employers - How to pitch your learners to employers - "Do's" and "Dont's" for working with employers - Preparing learners for success in work - Following up on employed learners - Partnership expectations Participants are encouraged to bring their own topics and questions!

Shemika Moore: Employer Relations and Retention Developer, Dorcas International Institute of Rhode Island. Her focus is to develop lasting relationships with employers.

Elizabeth Hanke: Workforce Coordinator, Genesis Center. Liz works directly with many local employers to facilitate internships and identify employment opportunities for Genesis learners.

Let's Figure it Out Carol Altreuter

Come ready to sample activities and teaching strategies designed to promote critical thinking, encourage persistence, and spark creativity. Exercises will involve math and science subject matter, but can be adapted to other content areas. You will leave with a few easy-to-make management tools, website resources, and a Math Tool Kit. Since learning is best accomplished in a non-threatening environment, we'll explore how to use routines to create a "mistakes are expected and valued" atmosphere. We will begin by solving a Math Murder Mystery. Time to discuss the relevance of these activities and strategies to multilevel classrooms will be part of the workshop.

Carol Altreuter's enthusiasm for working with ABE/ASE learners for over 30 years continues. She especially enjoys using activities which encourage active participation, are non-threatening, involve vocabulary development, and promote critical thinking.

Building Teacher Communities through the Common Core Standards Janet Lopes, Neila Healy & Ed Desrosier

Adult education professionals need to collaborate more in order to meet the needs of the twenty-first century learner. Building Professional Learning Communities (PLC) is essential to teaching differently; thereby, enhancing curriculum, while encouraging stronger communication with each other. In this workshop we will be discussing teaching smarter strategies and introducing interdisciplinary lessons, teaching methodologies and integrating science as an academic foundation. The principle of goal-oriented Backwards Design will stress the importance of prior knowledge, content-based instruction, critical thinking, and the inter-connectedness of all academic disciplines. Communities of Practice (COP), Common Planning Time (CPT), and effective staff meetings are some of the platforms for information sharing among adult education professionals that will be discussed. Teacher collaboration through effective communication is the essential key to successful student and program outcomes. The Common Core Standard is the thread which binds us all together.

Janet Lopes has over ten years' experience in adult education, GED, NEDP, Transition To College, and Accuplacer Prep at DIIRI. She is presently employed by Pawtucket Adult Education Program.

Neila Healy has been an adult basic education instructor for the Pawtucket School Department for the past ten years. She currently teaches ABE and Computer Science.

Ed Derosier has ten years of experience in adult education and is presently employed by DIIRI as an ABE instructor. He also works as a Math Coach at CCRI.

Why Performance Assessments Matter

Michael Brownstein

In order to help adult learners develop the skills, knowledge and dispositions necessary to navigate the college, career and life challenges in the 21st century, instructional practice and program design needs to change. This will require a shift in how learning occurs in the classroom. Teachers need to become the facilitators of their students' learner process. Programs also need to be designed to support students as they take greater ownership for their learning. Creating

high quality performance assessments help leverage this change. Performance assessments are open-ended tasks that require students to apply what they know and are able to do through a multi-step process, which results in an original product, performance or solution. In this session, participants will learn about designing and implementing performance assessment, and have practice examining the elements of exemplary ones.

Michael Brownstein provides professional development and tools for building assessment literacy that enable teachers, administrators, and policy makers to create and implement performance assessment systems.

Curriculum Challenges - Digital Literacy for staff, ELLs, low literacy and older students Larry Britt

Would you like some ideas and resources that could help your staff, administrators and volunteers obtain Northstar Digital Literacy Certifications that meet RIDE requirements? Are you ready to teach your students the same skills that you're encouraged to have? At this session we'll talk about, demonstrate and have participants review solutions that address the challenges of resistance and remediation for practitioners and staff. We'll also talk about and review curricula that are aligned to the Northstar standards. The discussion will include strategies and exploration of online resources that specifically address the Information Literacy needs of ELLs, low literacy learners and those that may be latecomers to the information age. The session will end with a short Q & A with a Digital Literacy Corps member. Teaching beginner computer classes is exhausting alone. Corps members earn a modest stipend for assisting in beginner computer classes. Simultaneously, they improve their own computer skills, gain work experience in the United States and greatly increase their self-confidence.

Larry Britt is a Technology Specialist and Teacher at RI Family Literacy, the RI Statewide Coordinator and Proctor Trainer for Northstar and member of the RI Adult Education Technology Advisory Committee.

ELL to ELL: English Perspective (Learner Roundtable)

Learning English as another language has many benefits and challenges that vary from language to language. In this focus group, my participants and I will be discussing our personal English experiences. The goal is to have English Language Learners participate in conversations relative to their everyday lives while those interested, may learn how to actively engage or relate to the English Language Learner. As an ELL myself, I understand the obstacles and challenges of immigrants and their children. A primary objective of an ELL classroom is to promote independent learning. I aim to use my experience to help empower ELLs to become educated in a country where the language is not spoken in their mother tongue. In turn, the students will gain a sense of independence, which can break the cycle of immigrant survival and culture shocks.

We will look at and discuss models that integrate face-to-face and online learning, both "turn-key" models that provide full content, with software for class registration, instruction, assessment and progress reports; and build-it-yourself models providing a platform for teachers to align what happens in class with online assignments, flipped learning presentations, and supplementary instruction. Participants will receive a link to a recently-published free online guide by the presenter, Blended Learning for the Adult Education Classroom.

She has helped facilitate Professional Development courses, participated in national webinars on formative assessment, and has recently presented at several statewide national conferences.

Transitions to College and Careers: Embedded Components Of the Transitions Model (Practitioner Panel)

The Rhode Island Transition to College and Careers Initiative is a collaborative effort of the Rhode Island Office of Adult Education and six Rhode Island adult education agencies including: Aquidneck Island Adult Learning Center, Community College of RI, Dorcas International Institute of RI, Education Exchange, RI Regional Adult Learning (RIRAL), and Westbay Community Action. The purpose of the Initiative is to support adult learners as they transition to post-secondary education or training. This panel discussion will include an overview of the essential components of a transition to college and careers program. Attendees will

learn about the opportunities for post-secondary preparation available through the RI Transition to College and Careers Initiative as well as strategies for incorporating key transition components in a wide variety of adult education settings.

Jane May, Ph. D. has worked with the *RI Transition to College and Careers Initiative* for seven years. Jane completed a doctoral degree in education with a focus on the adult learner. In addition, Jane is a certified reading specialist with experience teaching literacy to students in K-adult. As the coordinator for the *RI Transition to College and Careers Initiative* Jane advocates for access to postsecondary education for RI adult learners.

Voter Education Registration and Action (VERA)

Paulo Freire was a Brazilian educator who pushed other educators to rethink their role in education, language acquisition and social change. During this session, you will be able to elicit (unit) themes from class participants, and you will be able to practice some of the popular education tools to help develop class activities. We hope that you will be able to take these back to your own classrooms and implement them successfully!

Cristina has been practicing popular education based on Paulo Freire's principles since 2007, and it has made a huge difference in language acquisition and in creating meaningful social change.

The Digital Citizen: Technology in & out of classroom

Keri Marion

Adult learners have always been faced with the challenge of blending yesterday's skills with today's technology, and the 21st century continues to prove this maxim. Critical thinking takes a more prominent role in digital citizenship, as more and more information is skewed to present one-sided coercion to buy products or ideas. In the American landscape, we find that "political correctness" has been sold as an idea of repression, when, in fact, a critical thinker can still express his ideas without being offensive. We, therefore, have two objectives in the modern classroom: a) teach effective communication skills that express ideas clearly and objectively, and b) understand how technology plays a role in that communication today. Both of these primary skills are necessary for adult education, as taking tests increasingly require objective understanding and response to materials with tact and timeliness. We'll discuss some strategies to help illustrate the usefulness and benefits of making a digital citizen through an evolving, independent learner.

In addition to the complex dynamics of domestic violence, being an immigrant and/or the lack of immigration status results in another barrier to leaving abusive relationship. Culture, immigration status and even language barriers present challenges for victims. This training will provide an overview of some of the challenges faced by immigrant victims of domestic violence, recommendations when serving immigrant victims of DV and an overview of immigration benefits to victims of domestic violence.

Manager of Community Programs and BIA Accredited Representative, Gloria runs the Immigration Advocacy program at Sojourner House since June of 2012.

Literacy Discussion Circle

This workshop is for people who are teaching or who want to teach adults who have low or no formal education in their first language(s) and are learning English. This is a facilitated discussion, so participants are encouraged to bring favorite materials or lesson ideas to share as well as questions to discuss with the group. The Economic and Social Impact of Adult Education Programs in Rhode Island

DJ Cratty & Jill Holloway

This presentation reports the findings of a recent study conducted by national adult education researcher Stephen Reder, in collaboration with the Providence Public Library and West Bay Collaborative, and funded by the Joint Research Initiative of RIDE and RIOPC. In this study, data from various state agencies are linked to the adult education data, allowing the trajectory of individuals to be mapped from secondary school through to any postsecondary education and into the workforce. A range of economic and social outcomes are then compared for RI adult education program participants relative to similar RI adults who did not participate in the state's adult education programs. These outcomes are discussed in the context of Dr. Reder's findings in other regions as well as the different components and supports of the adult education programs in RI.

Dorothyjean Cratty is an economist on the RIDE/RIOPC Joint Research Initiative Grants researcher/practitioner team studying Rhode Island adult education student supports and outcomes.

Jill Holloway has been the Director of the RI Adult Education Professional Development Center since 2008
